You have been selected to attend Annual Training at *East Fortune*

for the week from *17th* to *24th June*. The party will

assemble at *Waverley Station*

on *17th June* at *3.30 pm.*

Accommodation and transport will be ~~provided free~~, but before going you will be called upon to pay to your Unit the sum of 12s. 3d. in respect of food.

Cadets must be in uniform and, besides clothing worn, they should take the following:—

- (1) Identity Card.
- (2) Ration Card.
- (3) Flying Log, with parents' consent to flight.
- (4) Respirator and Container.
- (5) Jotter and Pencil.
- (6) Pyjamas.
- (7) Shorts and/or Flannel Trousers.
- (8) Jersey, Sweater or Sports Shirt.
- (9) One spare pair of stout Boots or Shoes, also Shoes of Rubber or Light Leather for P.T., and Football Boots.
- (10) Handkerchiefs.
- (11) Rubberised Cape or Overcoat.
- (12) Two Towels, One Cake of Soap, Razor (if used), Tooth-brush, Hairbrush and Comb.

- (13) Overalls, if possible.
- (14) Change of Underclothing.
- (15) Spare Socks (thick).
- (16) Small amount of Pocket Money.
- (17) Bathing Costume.

Thick socks and stout boots or shoes should be worn. Thin shoes and socks are likely to cause blisters on the feet while marching.

Each Cadet is limited to one kitbag or suitcase, which must be properly and securely labelled: kitbags are strongly recommended.

Paper parcels must be avoided.

Cadets may take musical instruments or sports equipment, but no wireless sets are permitted. Motor cycles and cameras are forbidden. Cycles are forbidden unless special instructions are issued.

While at Camp you will be subject to the ordinary discipline of the Station, and you must carry yourself with the bearing for which the R.A.F. is noted. You and the whole Corps may be judged by your keenness when under instruction, your neatness and tidiness in dress, and smartness of bearing and walk, ~~and your~~ strict attention to the saluting of ~~Officers~~.

Annual Training life means hard work as well as play. Cheerfulness and readiness to share in the many tasks which may arise, will do much to make this one of the happiest experiences of your training.
